BROUGHTON'S INDEPENDENT STIRRER POLICE – NOT HELPING

Eyebrows have been raised at Police Scotland's response to a mini crime

wave in the New Town. Local businesspeople last month told *Spurtle* about recent New Town break-ins, thefts, or attempted breakins at Blue Barber, Chez Jules, Finnegan's Sandwich Bar, Gorgeous, Hugo Boss, Lisa V, New Town Deli, Pierre Victoire, Zen Kitchen and a beautician's on Cumberland Street.

Some complained of slow or no

appearances by community officers in the days after, and officers' reluctance or inability to record incidents where nothing was stolen.

Spurtle's detailed enquiries have been met with a general press release referring to just two of the incidents on 29 July. A police officer who attended last month's New Town & Broughton Community Council (NTBCC) knew nothing about any of them, and contradicted previous explanations of what kind of crime statistics are available to the public under the new Police Scotland regime.

In recent months, attendees at NTBCC meetings have noted very irregular police attendance, and the variable quality or quantity of information – even just on general trends – which has been imparted.

Spurtle continues to press Police Scotland and hopes to report back soon.

END OF THE ROAD FOR EAST SCOTLAND STREET LANE 'GARAGE'?

The Local Review Body of City of Edinburgh Council's D e v e l o p m e n t M a n a g e m e n t Subcommittee met on 20 August and discussed, among other things, the



controversial new building on East Scotland Street Lane (*Breaking news*, 2.5.14).

Mr Dermot Ferrigan had appealed CEC's earlier decision not to consent his property's change of use from domestic garage to an office. The LRB reviewed that decision, and found that officers' reasoning and procedures had been in order. The case has therefore reverted to Enforcement (Ref. 12/00577/ENCOMP) to remedy the breach of planning control. Neighbours will learn what is planned around the middle of the month.

Mr Ferrigan – who attended the LRB meeting – was dissatisfied with the outcome and made his feelings abundantly clear. In short, he said he would now look into taking the case to the Court of Session.

CUPCAKE PSEPHOLOGY'S AUGUST RESULTS

As *Spurtle* went to press, the latest figures for sales of Independence Referendum-themed cupcakes at Cuckoo's Bakery on Dundas Street (dated 8 August) were as follows: No: 41.2%, Yes 39.7%, Undecided 19.1%.

This represents a 4.3% surge towards the Yes campaign and an even greater 4.8% wobble towards Indecision since July. *Spurtle* remains cautious about



the results, which may say most about the now glutted or bedbound condition of enthusiastic No-cupcake purchasers who substantially out-ate' sweet-toothed political rivals over recent months.

The Referendum proper takes place on 18 September, with polling stations open from 7am–10pm.

NTBCC Council members have again blasted over-use of St Andrew Sq for events. They say the grass needs at least 6 months' rest to recover. Some are also dismayed at experimental decking and marquees erected on George St. CEC officials and Essential Edinburgh originally promised the new layout would be classy and uniform like the Oueen's garden parties. Critics, though, say it looks more like the backyard at Dobbie's.

Norma Prentice, head teacher at Drummond CHS, took up temporary secondment at Castlebrae High School on 25 Aug (Issue 231). She has been working over the summer with Leith Academy's depute head teacher Sue Cook, who will steer Drummond for the next year.

Tesco's imminent arrival on Dundas St has not prompted many whoops of delight locally (Breaking news, 22.7.14, 29.7.14). But NTBCC at least sees an opportunity. CEC should, it says, require a new, more appropriate 'heritage shopfront' (similar to that adopted by Sainsbury on Howe St) for the Category B-listed building.

Benches gone from Bellevue Cres (by the bus stop near Broughton St Mary's Parish Church) and Bellevue Place (outside Drummond CHS playground) are safe. Variously removed for maintenance, to fit a new plaque, and to allow access for 'forestry', they will return.

Locals tweet to beat the beaks

Residents frustrated by sloppy neighbours and confusion over new communal bins have launched the New Town Cleaner Streets Campaign (NTCSC; Breaking news, 11.8.14).

It aims to monitor local streets – so far, from Union Street to Fettes Row – and give helpful feedback to CEC officials. locate/photograph/



report problems via Twitter *Photo: Creative Commons, 37prime* (@NTCleanStreets), and encourage good practice/selfless refuse heroism with prestigious Golden Marigold awards. NTCSC told us 'Communal bins have recently been installed on Scotland, Nelson and Forth Streets plus parts of Royal Crescent, Dublin Street and Royal Circus.

We welcome containerisation and the Cockburn Association's dropping of its historic opposition, as the alternatives simply don't work. However, so far CEC's approach has been long on apologies and short on clarity and reliability.'

Some 7,700 New Town properties currently use containerised bins or gullproof bags, and a further 2,750 should get theirs by the end of the year.

A CEC spokesperson told Spurtle: 'As we roll out the service to parts of the New Town, we will continue to monitor the usage of the new bins and can adjust the collection frequency to meet demand.

Any streets that receive a communal bin will no longer have their rubbish collected in black bin bags.

Collections take place on Tuesday and Friday and there may be an additional day depending on need until the transition is complete."

Pilrig HMOs – time for a cap?

Leith Central Community Council shares locals' worries about how many Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMOs) there are in Pilrig.

At last month's meeting it emerged that there are already 26 such businesses in the area, with more potentially in the pipeline and applications for building warrants on another (listed) property suggesting it may be being converted by the back door.

Leith Walk ward's Councillor Blacklock has alerted Planning officials to the situation, and Councillor Gardner is investigating whether the number of HMOs here could be restricted as in Leith Links.

LCCC is not against HMOs, but says distributing them more evenly across the city would help prevent disproportionate shortages of locally resident householders in certain areas.

Lottery Fund support boosts Calton Hill gallery plan

Collective Gallery's project with City of Edinburgh Council to develop the City Observatory complex on Calton Hill has taken an important step forward. The Heritage Lottery Fund has given its initial support for a £900K bid.

Additional fund-raising continues, with Malcolm Fraser Architects planning the scheme to restore

William Playfair's design of 1822 (now Category A-listed and on the Buildings at Risk Register), create new gallery space and open up the whole area to the public in 2016.

Collective's artistic director Kate Gray said, 'The unique site will bring together the historical innovations in science with contemporary art, creating an inspiring and exciting environment for both artists and visitors.'

Homes not phones on right lines

Outline pre-application plans for demolition and redevelopment of the Standard Life call centre at 52-52a Annandale Street went on show last month (Ref. 14/02568/ PAN; Breaking news, 12.8.14). Developer Westpoint Homes proposes 120 bedrooms in 60 flats with 25 per cent reserved for affordable housing. Parking for 47 cars would be provided on site. Spurtle gives it a cautious thumbs-up at this stage.



Remembering the Great War

Of the capital's major commemorations of the centenary of the First World War's start, perhaps the most poignant is at the Scottish National Portrait Gallery (Floor 1) on Queen Street.

It comprises portraits, photographs and sculptures chiefly in the SNPG's holdings, and a section centred on Peter Cattrell's remarkable photography of the



present-day landscape of the Battle of the Somme in which over 57,000 British men were killed or wounded on its horrific opening day, 1 July 1916.

Highlights include: three astonishing photographs of wards in Springburn Hospital, Glasgow, where wounded soldiers were treated; Cattrell's image of acre on acre of harvested maize stems echoing the row on row of gravestones; and a bright, faintly blurred film of the 4th Cameron Highlanders, marching almost jauntily in full battle kit, pitching forward to sacrifice.

Rightly, the exhibition closes with Wilfred Owen's unbearably beautiful 'Anthem for Doomed Youth', and a final image by Cattrell of 'Shadows of War Crosses', a silver gelatine print made in 2014.

This marvellous exhibition – which is, in effect, itself a collective work of art of immense sensitivity and loving care – continues until 5 January 2015. Bell tolls for local couple

Jean and Archie Bell of Bellevue died on 17 and 24 July, and a joint celebration of their lives was held in the Lorimer Chapel, Warriston on 2 August, *writes John Dickie*.

Archie belonged to Broughton, man and boy, and vividly recalled picking up Spitfire and Hurricane bullets from the



playground of Bellevue (now Drummond) School during the war before evacuation.

Jean (née Bottomley) grew up in Dumbiedykes, but moved to Broughton upon marrying. For the St Ann's Reminiscence Group she recorded local memories including those of Mr Hope, the London Street Undertaker; Ella Brodie of Broughton Court and East London Street; and Harriet Barr, whose family owned Kidd's Dairy and general store at 2 Bellevue Street.

They were both among the earliest contributors to the *Spurtle*, and for many years members of the Broughton History Society. Our condolences go to their children and grandchildren.

NTBCC has also backed residents opposed to an access road into the **Sandy Hill site** behind Broughton Rd (Issue 232). CEC had received a **staggering 57 letters of objection** by 20 Aug, and 5 days later the application was withdrawn. Many residents suspect a long-term plan to extend access via **Heriot Hill Terrace**.

Mark Lazarowicz MP has asked Network Rail to look again at ease of access to Waverley Station. He also says it should be easier for people with mobility problems to come and go independently without having to rely on passenger assistance staff.
