GROUNDHOG DAY – E. SCOTLAND ST LANE ... AGAIN

The developer behind the controversial 'garage' on East Scotland Street Lane has again applied to change its use to a 'studio office' (Ref. 15/00147/FUL).

The plan entails restoring a glass frontage to the property, but this time set back behind the garage roller-door.

In support of the application, a design statement claims that the change would have no detrimental effect on the character or visual quality of the surrounding conservation area, would not impair neighbours' standard of living, and is no different to an existing consented office use further up the lane. It also points out the proximity of good public transport.

Local residents have opposed development here ever since it became clear that a like-for-like replacement of the original lockup was not intended.

This latest application was wearily expected, although locals are nonetheless infuriated by it. *Spurtle* hears they will object strenuously again, and that they draw little comfort from a previous refusal of office use here (Ref. 14/01419/FUL) being upheld on appeal last August. The latest design statement specifically addresses the grounds for that appeal decision.

Such have been the extraordinary convolutions in this case that some locals involved now have little confidence in officials' competence, whilst others – regrettably – have even begun to question their probity.

Spurtle would not go that far, but we are certainly concerned at any public perception that 'development by stealth' is not only possible but increasingly the norm.

LOCALS CONTINUE UPHILL STRUGGLE ON LEITH WALK

Leith Central Community Council is urging the Council to stop dragging its feet over repairs to Leith Walk between Pilrig Street and Picardy Place.

Of the £10m exclusively earmarked for Leith Walk repairs seven years ago, LCCC estimates that £4m may be left now that work is nearly complete from Pilrig Street down to the Foot of the Walk.

It wants this money spent now (focusing on tram-proofed sections), not indefinitely mothballed while CEC swithers over tramline extensions and Picardy Place development.

This aspiration – which *Spurtle* understands is shared and promoted by local councillors, often behind the scenes – is in addition to LCCC's demands for short-term patching of potholes along Leith Walk which pose a danger to cyclists. Officials have recently claimed there is no budget for such essential maintenance.

LCCC also seeks clarification on precisely which sections of Leith Walk have already been tram-proofed, with utilities diverted and the road reinforced where necessary. Officials are inexplicably

BROUGHTON'S GUINEA-PIGS RECYCLE MORE COLOURFULLY

A trial of new, simpler recycling arrangements for tenements will start in Bellevue this month and run for at least 6 months. Those affected – on Bellevue Gardens / Place / Road / Street / Terrace, Claremont Crescent, Melgund Terrace, E. Claremont and W. Annandale Streets should already have received a letter and explanatory leaflet. Red and blue box collections will stop.

Green-topped communal bins will be for: paper, cardboard, juice cartons plastic bottles, lids, pots, tubs, trays, tins, cans, aerosols and foil. (Everything you used to put in blue and red boxes, except glass.) Purple-topped communal bins will be for glass. Grey-topped communal bins will be for food waste (wrapped in newspaper or compostable bags). Black-topped bins are for non-recyclable waste, as before.



Meanwhile, LCCC has reacted scathingly to a CEC review criticising its own Leith Programme. The report (to the Finance and Resources Subcommittee on 15 January) praised staff agility, strong stakeholder arrangements and involvement by elected representatives.

However, it gave an overall Amber/Red assessment and said the programme 'would benefit greatly through strengthened governance arrangements, and the clarification of responsibilities, decision making and escalation processes'.

Vice Chair Harald Tobermann noted that one of LCCC's stakeholders had resigned in frustration, and that agility in this context was an incomprehensible term. His preference was for a stable plan implemented sharpishly.

'I share the review's doubts regarding governance arrangements,' he told *Spurtle*. 'It's a shame that the report remains silent on how the governance concerns have been addressed.'

Use of civic space in Council's sights

Readers of *Spurtle's* website will have noticed the considerable coverage we've given to George Street and St Andrew Square over recent months.

We've particularly criticised the extent and frequency of Essential Edinburgh's events programme in the square, not because we're snooty kill-joys but because we want its original purpose – as a tranquil green point of punctuation at the end of George St's sentence – to be preserved more of the time. Peace and quiet have as much of a right to the city centre as marquees, bright lights and helter skelters.

Coincidentally, it emerged last month that CEC is moving towards a root-and-branch reassessment of how Edinburgh's civic space is used, not least for commercial purposes. Parks are already covered in a separate document.

Work on this 'Public Spaces Manifesto', for the Corporate Policy and Strategy Subcommittee, is likely to begin in March and last two years.

Fresh start for Kail Kirk

The Scottish Historic Buildings Trust (SHBT) moved in at the Glasite Meeting House on Barony Street in November, *writes staff member Victoria Scarth*.

SHBT is a charity which saves important historic buildings at risk through conserving and adapting them to new uses. We've been operating for over 35 years (with a few name changes) and have saved over 30 historic buildings in that time.

At the Glasite Meeting House, the challenge is a bit different. It is a remarkable

survivor, built by the Glasite congregation in 1836 and continuing in their use until 1989. It's been generally well cared for, but it is now little used and access and facilities for those in wheelchairs are very limited.

SHBT has already increased footfall with an exhibition, and there are plans for a pop-up cinema during the Science Festival at Easter. But we're keen to know what the local community wants from the space.
