OBJECTIONS MOUNT TO CITY SUPERMARKETS

New Town and Broughton Community Council (NTBCC) has joined Leith Central Community Council (LCCC) in objecting to the Cooperative Group's proposed 'convenience store' at 8 McDonald Road (Issue 192).

Planning Convener John Knight said it would go against the city's Local Plan, which requires new developments not to adversely affect local town centres' viability and vitality.

LCCC Planning Convener Annette O'Carroll has alerted Cllr Alison Johnstone (Ward 10) to the case. Johnstone – at the City of Edinburgh Council (CEC) meeting on 10 March – sought acknowledgement for the benefits of thriving local high streets; highlighted competition faced by independent shops from large chain-stores; questioned the openness/transparency of planning procedures; and called for a report on whether existing measures offer sufficient protection to small, independent shops.

The day before, CEC's Economic Development Committee had announced that it would appoint 3 'retail champions' for 9 of Edinburgh's ailing town centres, including Leith Walk. They are expected to investigate extending pop-up shops, seasonal campaigns, local branding, and Festival venues. The initiative has emerged (slowly) from the report 'Building Stronger Town Centres' of August 2009. Johnstone is not impressed: if CEC were truly interested in the wellbeing of local high streets, she told O'Carroll, 'it would firmly uphold policies limiting expansion of supermarket chains'.

LCCC's letter of objection, Cllr Johnstone's agenda item (9.7), the Economic Development report of 2009, and the 'Physical Development Support Progress Report (Annexe 1) of 8 March outlining CEC's retail champion plans are all in *Extras* (4.4.11).

FLOOD-WORKS RAISE FEARS FOR RIVERSCAPE

They have been in the offing for ages, but now that work on Water of Leith flood prevention measures is about to begin, some locals are getting cold feet.

Nobody wants a repeat of the damage seen in 2003, but the effects on Edinburgh's 'silver thread in a green ribbon' are worrying. 'The impacts are huge and brutal,' writes Colin McShane, who contacted *Spurtle* on Facebook. 'Raised river walls, almost all trees being taken away, floodgates on Warriston Road and holes in the adjacent river wall so the road can be used as a flood plain, deep piling works etc. etc.: if you live locally or enjoy walking and the wildlife along the river, I recommend you check this out.'

An anonymous correspondent and Tweeting naturalist is also alarmed by the likely loss of trees, although more sanguine about the future of an otter he photographed for us last month. 'She will use over 10 miles of river as her territory and have several homes along that stretch. She'll relocate, I'm sure.' Like others we spoke to, he has found the plans now available in Stockbridge Library (see *Extras* 4.4.11) hard to visualise.

Water of Leith Conservation Trust staff we contacted understand local anxieties, but suggest that the time for hand-wringing is now well past. It seems we must steel ourselves for some ugly short-term changes, and wait patiently until their appearance softens over the years.



Bulging blister at **Broughton Point**


The ceaseless drip-drip of parental pressure on CEC has paid off after nearly a decade. A major redesign of the junction contour at Broughton Point, outside the primary school, was completed after two weeks work last month. It means vehicles can no longer turn at speed from Broughton Rd into E. Claremont St, rendering life for pedestrians particularly local schoolchildren
significantly safer.



Profile: Thomas Wemyss Fulton (1855– 1929)

In this, the last of his series on our area's association with the history of marine science, Jim Adams profiles Thomas Wemyss Fulton, the first Scientific Superintendent of the Fishery Board for Scotland.

Fulton was born in 1855, probably in one of the red-brick cottages that snake eastwards from Granton Harbour where his father was Deputy Pier Master. By 1866 he lived at 2 Paterson's Court, Old Broughton (Breaking news 1.11.10), his home for at least 18 years before moving to 20 Royal Crescent where he still resided at the time of his marriage in 1894. To help pay his way as a medical student at Edinburgh University, Fulton worked as a telegraphist by night, showing 'indomitable strength, courage, and self-denial' which paid off when, in 1884, he graduated with first-class honours, and published a This Fulton's surface drifter was 152mm long.



paper – still referred to in accounts of repetitive strain injury – on telegraphists' cramp. However, we have no record of his subsequent work as a doctor.

In 1888—after two years in the Challenger Office (Issue 176)—he joined the Fishery Board at 101 George Street, but, with the Board's transferral of its fish hatchery and laboratory from Dunbar to Aberdeen in 1898, Fulton moved north to take charge. There, hatchery operations ceased in the 1920s, but the laboratory is now of world renown and employs over 200 staff. Fulton's own pioneering work was impressive and wide-ranging; for example, from the maturation of fish eggs in the ovary (which gained him an MD with a gold medal in 1897) to the impact of trawling. Also, in 1894, he began using drifters to chart the currents of the North Sea. This method was still in use in the 1960s, and, at one stage, the drift bottle enclosures (with instructions to the finder once likened to the shipwrecked sailor's message) were printed by Morrison & Gibb at Tanfield.
