PROUD TO BE RESTORING DONALDSON'S



Donaldson's, set amidst 18 acres of elegant grounds, is dominated by the central Playfair Building: a distinctive quadrangular building built in the 1840s and designed in the style of a Jacobean palace by world-famous Scottish architect William Henry Playfair. Offering spectacular panoramic views of Edinburgh's cityscape, the Playfair Building includes a seven bay dining hall with ribbed ceiling, an attractive internal courtyard and external balustrade terraces leading to sweeping lawns and period gate lodges.

City & Country will be using their extensive expertise to sensitively breathe new life into the building, reinstating and enhancing original features as well as redesigning the surrounding landscape. The company will be working closely with leading Scottish housebuilder CALA Homes, who themselves will bring forward a sensitive new build development to the rear of the Playfair Building.

"The Playfair Building at Donaldson's is a truly inspiring building of immense history and character and our first development outside of England. We believe that our expertise and strong track record in working with nationally important heritage assets, as well as our in-depth understanding of the intricacies involved in this type of work, will stand us in very good stead to deliver a restoration of which the city of Edinburgh will be genuinely proud."

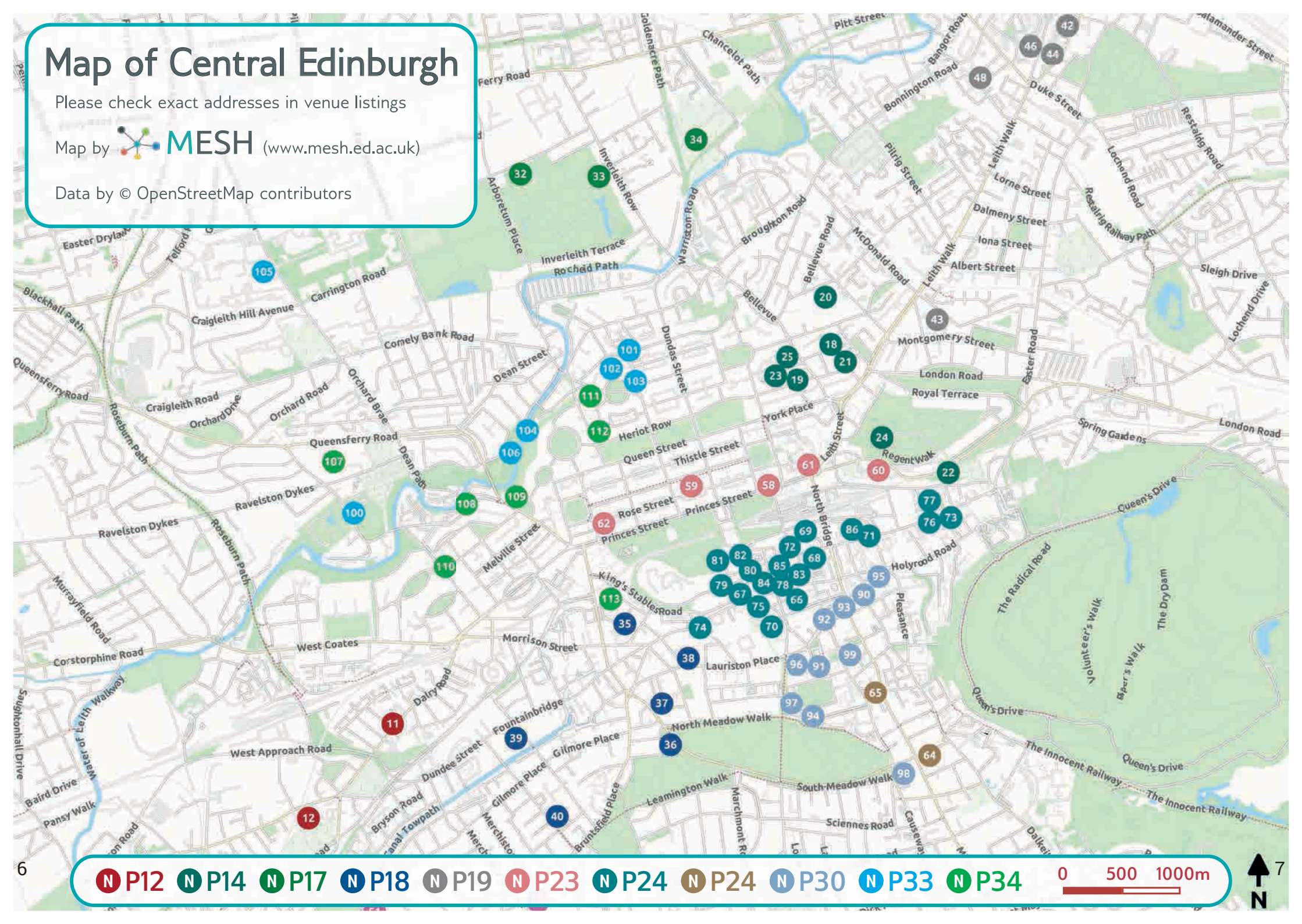

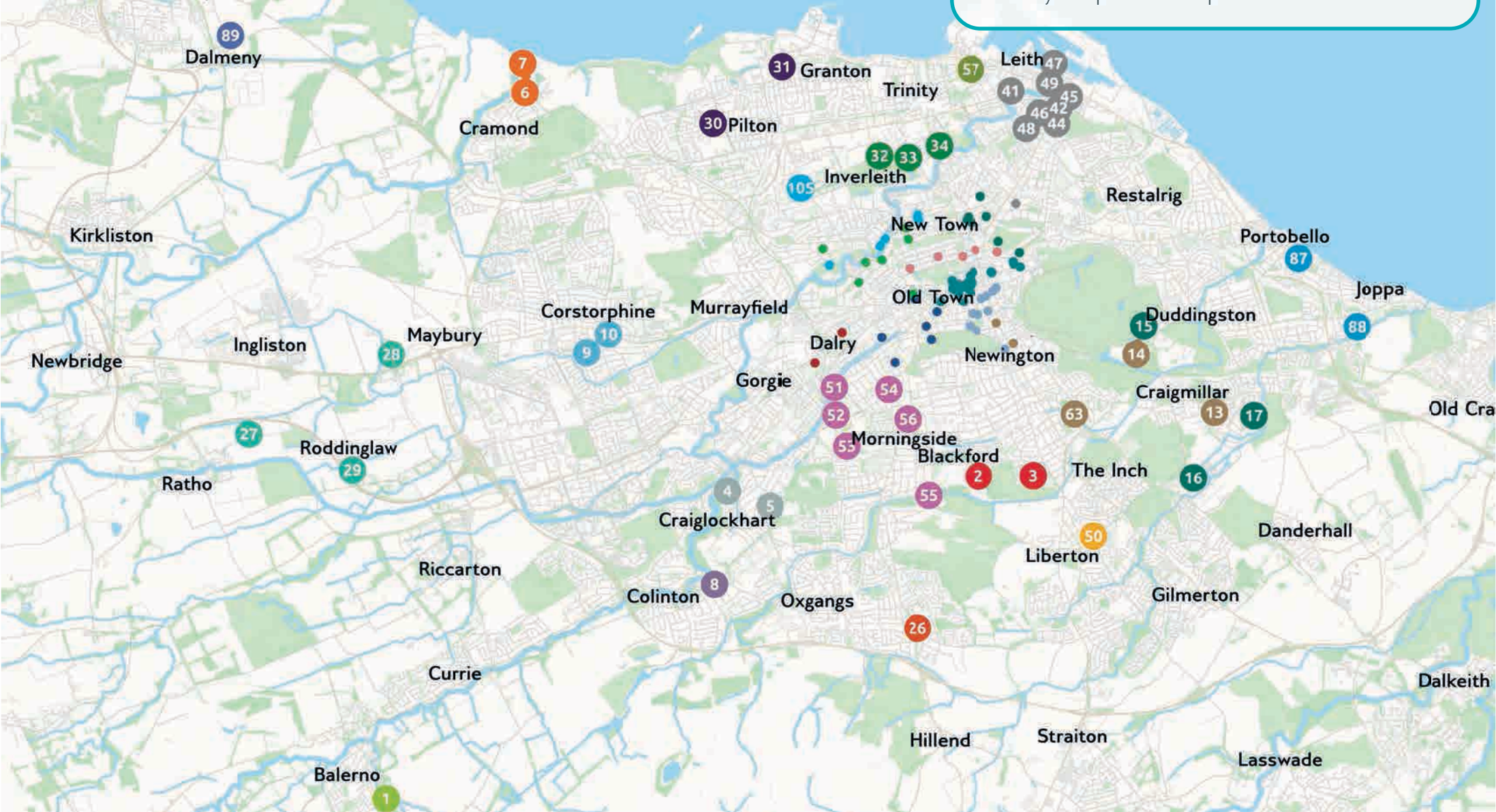

Harmeny School is a residential special school working with young children who have complex social, emotional and behavioural needs. Richard Murphy Architects designed a courtyard development of new classrooms and residential cottages sympathetic to the original house, which was designed by Robert Rowland Anderson in 1906, and extended by Robert Lorimer in 1907.

The garden provides a unique setting for a remarkable mental health service, nestling in the peaceful haven of Edinburgh's Colinton Dell. It is a working organic garden with a rich history of supporting people with mental health problems, providing training, and assisting them in their recovery.

Craiglockhart Campus houses the Business School's funky headquarters, where cutting-edge architecture meets listed buildings, up to the minute study facilities, and a buzzing café. Extensively refurbished in 2004, the facilities include two large lecture theatres, plenty of computing facilities and unique event venues. Part of the campus was originally Craiglockhart Hydropathic during WWI, then used as a military hospital treating shell-shocked officers. It was here that famous poets Wilfred Owen and Siegfried Sassoon wrote some of their most famous works.

6. CRAMOND KIRK

Built on the site of a Roman fort, there have been references to a church in Cramond as far back as 1256. The current building is on the site of its predecessors; its plain cruciform shape can be traced to 1656. Cramond Kirk is a vibrant and well-supported church with

strong links to the local community. Cramond Kirk's graveyard is not only very well maintained, but has gravestones dating back to 1608 and a number of Commonwealth War Graves.

7. THE MALTINGS

The building was part of the original village inn, The Royal Oak, comprising the inn, maltings, brewhouse, accommodation, and stabling. All of these buildings still exist, apart from the inn itself. The complex pre-dates the existing Cramond Inn and is mentioned in Robert Louis Stevenson's book 'St Ives' in which it is called 'The University of Cramond'. The Maltings is used as an education and exhibition centre while its associated brewhouse holds an archive of local documents, photographs, ephemera etc.

Guided walks will be conducted up the River Almond by local guides. One of these, covering the area's industrial past, will start at the Maltings and continue up river to Cramond Brig. The other will provide a conducted tour of the area's rich archaeological heritage. Start time 2.00pm each day and will last approximately 2 hours.

8. ST CUTHBERT'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH, COLINTON

The main part of St. Cuthbert's Church was completed in May 1889. Robert Rowand Anderson (1834-1921), the renowned Scottish Architect, was a founding member of this Church. He designed and supervised the building and was responsible for the internal decoration and furniture, much of which is unique. Over the years the Church has been extended and the spectacular painted ceiling, rood screen, font and stained glass windows have been added.

10. CORSTORPHINE OLD PARISH CHURCH

KIRK LOAN, EDINBURGH, EH12 7ST

This beautiful old Medieval Church opened in the 15th century as a Collegiate Church. After the Reformation the College was dissolved, and the Church was used for parish worship. From 1650 to 1651 the Church building was occupied by Cromwell's troops for twelve months, and it is thought that the defacement of effigies and memorials took place during this period. To this day the Old Parish is a focal point of the Village, and a hive of activities all year.

9. THE DOWER HOUSE, THE CORSTORPHINE HERITAGE CENTRE

Built around 1587, its alternative name, Gibsons Lodge, comes from the Gibsons of Pentland family who lived here in the late 18th century. From the mid-19th century to 1923, the house was tenanted by generations of the Thomson family, highly respected market gardeners. The house has Scottish crow-stepped gables and scrolled screw puts. The exterior is harled and lime washed, and shows signs of alterations. Since 1991 it has been the headquarters of the Corstorphine Trust.

The evolution from a green field off Dalry Lane (now Road) to a modern atmospheric church community café in 150 years is traceable. See the beautiful Mary Wood 1927 stained glass windows and learn about their fascinating story. Enjoy the scrumptious cakes, aromatic coffees, varied teas, and experience the 21st century ambience of a Fairtrade café... and lots, lots more.

The group registered as a charity in 1978, and the Farm opened to the public in 1982. Going strong for 33 years, it is now an established resource and popular visitor attraction in Edinburgh. It is unique as a real working Farm in the heart of the city.

This 'Arts and Crafts' style A-listed building, is an ecumenical chapel, open to all. The chapel was set up in 1950 by Sir Frances and Lady Tudsbery to commemorate their only son Robin, killed in action at the end of WWII. The chapel has a magnificent set of Sadie McLellan stained glass windows, nature themed wood carvings by Thomas Goode, and beautiful wrought iron work by J. Finnigan.

A professional choir sings Choral Evensong every Sunday at 4pm.

Wauchope Mausoleum was built in 1735 as the last resting place for the family who were the lairds of Niddrie Marischal from the late 14th century. Now a B-listed Scheduled Ancient Monument, the mausoleum was built by Andrew Wauchope over the tomb of his ancestor William Wauchope, who died in 1587. The building features a Classical facade and includes stonework that was part of an earlier chapel dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which was built in 1502 but destroyed in 1688.

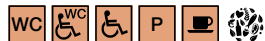

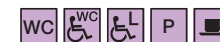

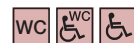

New College was designed by William Henry Playfair for the Free (later United Free) Church of Scotland in 1846, after the 1843 'Disruption' from the Church of Scotland. Following the Churches reunion in 1929, New College merged with the University of Edinburgh's Faculty (now School) of Divinity in 1935, and is a renowned centre for Theology and Religious Studies. Its twin towers form a dominant part of Edinburgh's spectacular skyline. Visitors will have access to Rainy Hall, a 1900 gothic-style refectory hall, named after Prof Robert Rainy, Principal of New College and Moderator of General Assembly of the United Free Church; Martin Hall, the former Library Hall, with the War Memorial stained glass window by Douglas Strachan and now a teaching and lecture room, named after Prof. Alexander Martin, Principal of New College and site of signing of union between Church of Scotland and United Free Church in 1929; New College Library, Originally the High Kirk of the Free Church of Scotland.

The Scottish Parliament met in the Hall while the Holyrood building was being constructed.

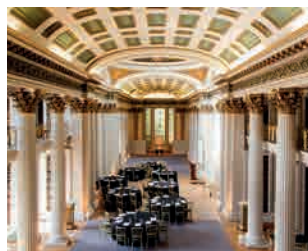

The Signet Library is home to the Society of Writers to Her Majesty's Signet – WS Society for short. The Society goes back to the 15th century as the officers authorised to produce royal manuscripts with the King of Scotland's seal, 'the Signet'. The 'Writers' were part of the College of Justice established by James V in 1532 which recognised judges and lawyers as separate from the state and is the bedrock of Scotland's legal system. 'Writers to the Signet' have played a prominent part in the development of Edinburgh and Scotland, not just in law but in other areas. For example, Sir Walter Scott was apprenticed as

a WS. The Society today remains a highly respected and prestigious body of lawyers.

The Signet Library building, designed by Robert Reid with interiors by William Stark, was completed for the WS Society in 1822 in time for the famous visit to Edinburgh of King George IV. William Playfair and William Burn were also involved in alterations to the building. It is a classical masterpiece and a category A listed building.

It was restored by the Cockburn Association in 1910. Here Daniel Defoe edited the Edinburgh Courant (1710) and the shop was the premises of publisher Archibald Constable (1774-1827). Outside on the street is one of the wells which used to provide the water supply for the Old Town.

The office of the Cockburn Association is located in the old cellars of Moubray House and is accessed from the garden at the back of the building. Limited wheelchair access to the garden only, down a steep close.

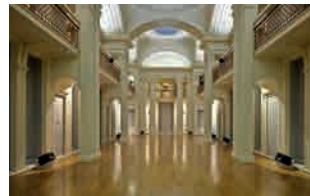

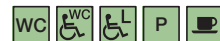

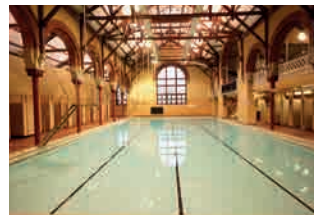
